



LHJH Celebrates its 30th Anniversary



This year Lake Highlands Junior High is thirty years old. Yes, the school is thrity! As you know, there have been many changes since 1960, but there are many aspects that have remained the same. Did you know that in 1960 A hall was the entire school? Would you believe that the current ISS Room was the main office?

These are just two changes that were observed by Mrs. Goldsberry who has witnessed the school's growth since she was a member of the first freshman class in 1960. She remembers in September of 1960 there was no cafeteria, no gym, no band hall, no auditorium, and no B or C halls. The rest of the school was still under construction. Besides the main office being moved from the current ISS room to its present location, the library was transported from the homemaking / sewing room to the location in upstairs C hall. The school had no air conditioning! Can you imagine what that was like?

delectible, edible, and almost digestble food. (Thats a lot of bull!) Before then, the students are sack lunches in their classrooms. Milk was delivered to the classrooms by Library Workers, Science Club, Choral (girls only), and ladies who worked at Lake Highlands Elementary or Wallace Elementary. With parent permission, students could walk home for lunch. Most students lived within reasonable walking distance from the school.

Girls dressed out for P.E. in a room in upstairs A hall. They wore a white, one piece jump suit. Boys dressed out in the boiler room. Most of the P.E. activities were conducted in the turnaround drive in front of the school or on the grounds where the tennis courts are now. Construction equipment occupied the rest of the grounds.

In 1960, students established what became traditions for LHJH. A student vote was conducted to choose school colors and a mascot. The words to the school song were composed by Margaret Johnson, a freshman in In November of 1960, the cafeteria was ready to serve 1962. The only school dance was held in May of 1961 for Freshman only. The National Junior Honor Society, Future Homemakers of America, Student Council, Band were originated. The Slide Rule Club was the only group started then that has not survived the test of time. Pep rallies took place once a week and the greater majority of the students cheered enthusiastically at the pep rallies. The only electives offered the first year were band, choir, home economics, art, and athletics,

Mr. Farris, who began teaching here in 1968, has seen the facilities improve with age. Science labs, computers, and the north wing of the library were among the important additions. Televisions and VCRs were not readily available to help students learn in the 60's as they are now. And who ever could have known what MAD MAX was to be? Mrs. Boothe, who attended Lake Highlands in 1965, started teaching here in 1970. One of her most meaningful experiences was helping her 6th period art class of 1975 paint the mural on the cafeteria wall dedicated to Tom Brewton, (THE MAN), the 1975 Student Council poresident killed in June of 1975. The mural was designed a by Raymond Navarro. Miss Thomas, a student here from 1966 to 1967, has taught at LHJH since 1976 and feels more teachers care about the students now than when she was a student. Miss Walker notes that the cafeteria and gym still smell the way they did in 1968 when she was a student in the building. She has been teaching at LHJH since 1980. Mr. Williams, a student from 1971 to 1973, started teaching at LHJH in 1983. Coach Sweeney, Mr. Fariss, Mrs. Bailard, Mrs. Kleinneiur, Mrs. Laska, Miss Boothe, Dr.Bell. Mrs. Dose, and Mr. Clark were all staff members when he was a student at LHJH, Mr. Williams commends the reputation LHJH has throughout the city for its excellent standards. Maybe that's why so many former students choose to return here when entering the teaching profession. You could say the more things change, the more they stay the same!


